INSIGHT 1

YOU OPTIMIZE FOR SALARY OVER SUSTAINABILITY

Of course, compensation matters.

But salary without alignment often leads to early burnout and short tenures.

If workload, culture, and growth don't support long-term performance, higher pay won't solve deeper friction.



INSIGHT 2

YOU CONFUSE FAST INTERVIEWS WITH GOOD FIT

A quick hiring process can feel efficient and affirming.

But speed does not guarantee clarity.

If expectations, success metrics, or team dynamics weren't discussed thoroughly, important signals may have been missed.



INSIGHT 3

YOU IGNORE LEADERSHIP PATTERNS

Candidates often evaluate tone and friendliness.

But leadership effectiveness shows up in decision-making, communication habits, and accountability structures.

If those patterns are unclear, long-term satisfaction becomes unpredictable.



INSIGHT 4

YOU ASSUME GROWTH WILL “WORK ITSELF OUT”

Growth rarely happens by accident.

If development paths, skill-building opportunities, or stretch assignments weren't discussed, advancement may not be structured and therefore be an unclear or moving target.

Assumptions made now create disappointment later.



INSIGHT 5

YOU PRIORITIZE BRAND OVER ROLE DESIGN

Well-known companies can feel like safe bets.

But title clarity, scope, and influence matter more than logo prestige.

A strong brand does not guarantee strong role alignment.



INSIGHT 6

YOU SAY YES OUT OF RELIEF

After a long search, especially if you're unhappy where you are, relief can override evaluation.

But decisions made to escape uncertainty often create new uncertainty later.

Confidence, not urgency, should guide acceptance.



INSIGHT 7

YOU DON'T EVALUATE CULTURE INTENTIONALLY

Culture isn't defined by perks or mission statements.

It shows up in how feedback is given, how conflict is handled, and how success is measured.

If you don't ask qualifying questions and actively assess these signals, misalignment can surface quickly.
